

Parish or planners: who decides?

Who has the biggest say in Brandeston's future: us or the planners?

That is the key question which is driving moves to implement a parish plan.

Though the local planning authority will always have powers to dictate policy at a district level, a strong parish plan drawn up by Brandeston itself will weigh heavily in any future planning decisions.

The plan also has other virtues. It means that the village has a platform on which we can debate what we want for our future.

Alarmed villagers turned up at the first public meeting at

shock suggestions that there may be calls for street lights in Brandeston.

Parish council bosses later made clear there were no requests for street lights.

But a strong plan, backed by the village, can make sure no such ideas are ever likely to emerge.

The plan is intended as a blueprint for all aspects of our future which concern us.

It could include social and community matters, transport and other services, economic issues, land and the environment, leisure, facilities for the young and the old and communications. Membership of the steering group is open to anyone living in the village. But it is important in any case that the final

go to every house in the village.

Nick Hayward and Alastair Chapman are working on a draft. The questionnaire will need to be extensive, and it is expected to be distributed during October. Once the initial results are analyzed, villagers will be invited to an open event, at which the initial findings can be discussed informally over a cup of tea or a glass.

That event is provisionally planned for early next year.

One of the most interesting questions concerns the age at which villagers should be eligible to put forward their views.

Other villages have plumped for 16 as the minimum age, but the strong feeling of the steering committee is that this is too conservative, and should be lower. Since the plan concerns the future, it should reflect the opinions of those who will grow up to inherit the village.
