A NEW EMERGENCY RESPONDER SERVICE IN SUFFOLK

Suffolk Careline is a new service that will enable vulnerable Suffolk residents to call for immediate assistance at the touch of a button

Clients can have the choice of who responds to their call, either a relative or friend, or a qualified member of the Suffolk Careline staff. The service is available 24 hours a day seven days a week and aims to respond in person within 45 minutes. If the nature of the call is more serious the emergency services can also be dispatched.

The launch programme means that South and West Suffolk are now currently receiving service, with North Suffolk coming on stream on 18th December 2011. Suffolk Careline service is designed to compliment other public sector services already in operation such as the Primary Care Trusts and the East of England Ambulance Trust.

First Clients: Wayne Bennett has recently had a Suffolk Careline monitoring system installed in his elderly mothers home and said: "I want to thank Suffolk Careline for their ultra quick response in setting up a personal alarm system for my elderly mother. This service has given my mother and us as a family a great deal of comfort and peace of mind."

The service will help to increase and maintain a person's level of independence for longer. The service is suitable for anyone but will be of particular importance to:

- Older people
- People living alone
- Other vulnerable adults, as part of a care package
- Family carers that want some additional support

TIMES PAST

Little is known about a number of the clergy who lived and served in our parishes. However, sometimes a document or paper comes to light which reveals a previously unknown story. The Reverend Thomas Wilson was Vicar of Brandeston and Parham from 1724 until his death in 1753 at the age of sixty two. He was probably the son of the preceding cleric, William Wilson who as Vicar of Brandeston and Cretingham had died in April 1724.

The following statement besides establishing that Thomas Wilson had a decisive character also shows another glimpse into the life of the Reverend John Lowes:-

- I, Thomas Wilson, Vicar of the parish of Brandeston in the County of Suffolk do protest against the pretended customs of the said Parish, and do refuse to sign them for the following reasons.
- 1st. It is certain the said Customs have not been signed by any Vicar of the said Parish for above 40 years past and I have been informed that they never were signed by any Vicar but only Mr Lowes in the year 1606 when they were agreed to, and set down in writing Indented under the Hands and Seals of Mr Lowes, and of the Chief Inhabitants, and seem to be no more than a particular Agreement between him and his Parishioners.
- 2^{dly}. The Custom which Prescribeth Cheese in lieu of Tythe Milk is an unreasonable custom, and may in time be claimed and insisted on to deprive the Vicar of the greatest part of his Profits arising from the Cows. The said Custom specifyeth in substance as followeth the Vicar shall have every year fifteen cheeses of every Inhabitant that maketh cheese, not exceeding ten to the weigh in the biggest Dairies, and in the smaller Dairies which cannot make them of that weight, then as large as they can make them. The weight and the number of the cheese being hereby limited, and no provision made for any alteration which may happen by joining two or more farms together whensoever that is the case the Tythe Cheeses of the Farm or Farms so added is wholly lost by this Custom, and the Farm to which they are added shall pay no more, nor larger cheese that it did before such Additions were made to it.

October 26: 1725 Thomas Wilson

Cheese seems to have been a very important part of the Tithe which represented a tenth of the annual produce. Brandeston and Kettleburgh would have been in the rich dairy pastures which disappeared when corn growing took over during the Napoleonic Wars.

Let us hope that 2010 will produce a good harvest for everyone.
