Dear Friends

The Feast of St Michael and All Angels, or 'Michaelmas' was celebrated on 29th September. Falling as it does near the equinox, it is associated with the beginning of autumn and the shortening of daylight. St Michael is one of the principal angel warriors, a protector against the dark of night, and it's an interesting connection that the Michaelmas daisy, one of the latest flowering plants in our gardens, blooming between August and October, has bright little flowers doing their own bit to also combat the advancing gloom of autumn and winter. Five of our seven parish churches held Harvest Festival Celebrations before 2nd October this year, and maybe harvest and the autumn that it heralds, feels particularly early this year because of the hot weather we had in April/May. But whatever the reason, our harvest is now worldwide; and no longer bound by the seasons. At the time of writing, the new black grape vine in my greenhouse has been yielding bunches of sweet, ripe dessert grapes for nearly three weeks already, and the hedgerow elderberries were fully ripe and being eaten by the birds in mid August, the seasons rotate ever quicker it seems to me.

So before short, dark, days descend on us as the clock changes, it seems right to a pause for a moment and give thanks for all the bounty a generous God bestows on us, and to remember at the same time the less fortunate people of our world. A world where in many places the harvest has failed or is so poor that people continually live at a subsistence level, and a world in which many countries rely on foreign aid just for the essentials of life.

Whereas, our harvest is no longer just what we grow and produce for ourselves, and because we are wealthy we are able to have the best the worlds harvest has to offer. ***Just think of the scale of the world's harvest, it stuns the mind with its magnitude, and yet people in some places go hungry everyday of the year, how sad is that!***

Father in heaven, all good gifts come from you.

*You send the sunshine and the rain, the light and the dark,
and it is through your love and care that we have a harvest to celebrate.*

*Thank you for providing so richly for our needs,
may we be willing to share the good things we have
with those who have little or nothing.*

*We ask your blessing on the worldwide harvest,
of the land, and of the sea,*

*Bless too the harvest of technology and factory,
of research and creative art.*

*May we live in harmony with your creation
and in every area of life*

ALL SAINTS CHURCH BRANDESTON APPEAL

The Rev Robin Alderson writes:

With the members of the Brandeston Parochial Church Council, I would like to give my personal thanks to everyone who responded with such generosity to our appeal for donations to the programme of repairs to the fabric of Brandeston Church.

When we made this appeal, we had about half the funding required to complete the necessary work, which had been estimated to cost about £46,000.

Now, the amazingly open-handed response of Brandeston parishioners and of many other people with connections to All Saints Church, and with grants from a number of grant-making bodies, more than £20,000 further funding has been raised, and we anticipate some further grants by the end of the year. This has enabled us to set the work in progress.

In the next week or so, you should see the contractors begin to work on the outside of the Church. Once the external repairs have been completed, and after time has been allowed for the fabric to dry out, the internal work will begin, and we hope that by Easter next year, all will be complete.

It is an amazing achievement that this amount of money has been raised in such a short space of time for a small village like Brandeston, and I am immensely grateful to all those who have supported All Saints Church in this way.

TIMES PAST

Whilst Frederick Cullum was still the miller in Kettleburgh, from 1871 he employed a journeyman miller from Hoxne to help him. Alfred Aldred who lived at Water Mill House was twenty seven years of age. He married at Kettleburgh, the same year, Rachel Kent, a daughter of Henry and Lydia Kent. He was a master glazier who lived with his family at what is now 'Langhurst'.

By 1874 the newly weds had moved to Saxstead Windmill. It is pleasant to think that our inheritance of Saxstead Mill was served by a man who learnt his trade and owed his experience to working with the water and wind mills in Kettleburgh.

The same year Charles Austin, the owner of Brandeston Hall and the surrounding estate died. Consequently a sale of some of his farm equipment was arranged for Michaelmas 1875 at a farm he owned in Kettleburgh, probably Brook Farm.

Alfred Aldred attended the sale. According to the Framlingham Weekly News, under the influence of drink he stole two horse rugs and a horse bit. The miller was brought up before the magistrates at Framlingham Petty Sessions where the case was adjourned on two surities of £20..0..0 each together with one of £40..0..0 from his solicitor.

When the case came up again on October 20th 1875 it was said that the value of one horse rug was half a crown, (2 shillings and 6 pence or 12½p. The owner Mr George Willis, a farmer from Sweffling had driven to the sale in a horse and cart, having with him a rug and a whip. He left these in the yard between four and five p.m., the rug had been found at Saxstead Mill by the police. Alfred had reached the sale about half past three; there were testimonials to his previous good character. He was further charged with stealing the second horse rug from an Easton man and the bit from a Dennington resident. It was stated that the prisoner had been drinking on the morning of the sale and was "freshy" before he started from his home for Kettleburgh. He was sentenced to fourteen days imprisonment for each of two offences, the terms to run consecutively. A harsh sentence, perhaps Alfred Aldred had enemies. In later years he was a much respected figure in the neighbourhood.

In 1897 Alfred Aldred, now fifty three, bought the Kettleburgh Water Mill where he had lived and worked as a young man for £300..0..0 from the Cullum family. This included the Mill, Mill Meadow, the windmill site and an adjoining meadow on the Hoo bank of the Deben. He continued to run Saxstead Windmill and Kettleburgh Watermill with the help of William Robinson in Kettleburgh. We have photographs of Alfred and Rachel Aldred taken at the Water mill.

Milling was now in serious decline and the Water Mill, soon after 1900, ceased grinding corn. In 1910 Alfred Aldred died and the following year Rachel sold the Kettleburgh property for £260..0..0. She died in 1928 aged 93.

Thus Kettleburgh's connections with Saxstead Windmill finished.
