Dear Friends,

I write this letter in August on a hot sunny day – two days before going on holiday! And here I am attempting to write the letter for the September magazine, part of me not wanting to project that far forward. So, a compromise. Looking at the list of saints in the September diary, I came across ‘John Chrysostom’.....’Bishop of Constantinople, Teacher of the Faith’. His feast day is September 13th –long enough away to make the date seem manageable and far enough ahead for you to book the date in your diary with impunity!

John was born in Antioch in about 347. He was a brilliant preacher which earned him in the sixth century the surname ‘Chrysostom’, literally ‘golden-mouthed’. He is honoured as one of the four Greek Doctors of the Church.

Against his wish he was made Patriarch of Constantinople in 397. He set about reforming the Church and exposing corruption amongst the clergy and in the Imperial administration. ‘Mules bear fortunes and Christ dies of hunger at your gate’ he is alleged to have cried out. He fell foul of the Empress Eudoxia and, in spite of the support of Pope Innocent 1 of Rome, was sent into exile twice, finally dying of exhaustion and starvation in September 407, with the words ‘Glory be to God for everything’ on his lips.

You may well recognize the prayer of St.Chrysostom at the end of Morning and Evening Prayer, which include those lovely words ‘Almighty God...who dost promise that when two or three are gathered together in thy Name thou wilt grant their requests...

What a wonderful prayer of assurance to us clergy!

I am off shortly to the beach to swim and sunbathe and hopefully to catch some brown shrimps as a seasonable bonus!

GET ON YOUR BIKE IN FRAMLINGHAM FOR ST ELIZABETH HOSPICE

Cyclists are asked to get into gear for a fundraising ride called On Your Bike! in aid of St Elizabeth Hospice.

Whether you are a serious cyclist or want a family ride out, you will be welcome to take part in the event on Sunday 2nd September starting from Framlingham College.

There are four distances to choose from all starting from: 75 mile, 50 mile, 15 mile or a family three mile ride.

Cyclists are asked to raise sponsorship and all proceeds will help the Hospice, an independent charity which costs £8.7m a year to run, provide services free of charge for patients in Suffolk and Norfolk as well as support for their relatives and carers.

Entry fees in advance are £15 for the longer rides and £7 for the 15 mile circuit. The family three mile ride is £4 per person or £20 for a family ticket (max two adults and three children). Rides start between 9am and 10.30am.

FROM THE REGISTERS

PEGGY DENISE MEADOWS

Sadly we record the death of Peggy Meadows, aged 85 years, who died at Rendlesham Care Centre on 10th July 2012. A service of Celebration for her life was held on Friday 20th July followed by interment in the churchyard into her husband Wilf's grave. The church was full for the service, taken by Rev. Graham Vellacott, and there was reading by her grandchildren, Sophie and Edward. Following the service there was a reception at Brandeston Queen's Head.

Peggy Denise Meadows

Peggy Denise Dean (later nicknamed Peggy two knees), was born in the East end of London in May 1927, the penultimate child of Harry and Hettie Dean. Hettie was around 40 and Harry 60+ at the time - there then followed one more child, Tony.

Life was very hard for them all. Harry was a shoemaker by trade and Hettie had many jobs including delivery of the the local babies, taking in washing, and even had lodgers to boost the income.

Peggy's younger brother Tony, 15 months younger, seemed to bear the brunt if his older sisters' tormenting, and Peggy often recalled how her and her sister liked nothing better than to nip him under the table, and they would even go as far as bashing his head on the skirting board!

Peggy would recall, with great fondness, memories of her siblings, particularly her sister Joyce, who married a GI and lived in many places over the years, but often managed to get tours of duty back in the UK. Her older brother Mick was much like a young father to her, and they would all get together whenever they could.

After War was declared, Peggy was evacuated to Wing, where she spent several very happy years with her evacuee parents. It didn't seem to occur to her that she would have to return home, wherever that was going to be, until she was sent the royal command to return home, as she was to be a bridesmaid. Sadly this was not the truth, and in fact Hettie had secured a job for her in their new home town of Ipswich. She would often recall, with much sadness, that she was duped into this return, but had to bite the bullet and take the job at Ransomes and Rapiers.

When she was 19 she joined the Land Army, and was posted to Easton, where she met Wilf, a local lad, and the youngest of a large family also, on the farm where she was stationed. She was given the job of looking after the dairy herd, and would think nothing of cycling from Easton to Ipswich, around 18 miles, on her day off.

Peggy and Wilf became engaged and married in 1949, in her local church in Ipswich. Harry, by then 82, was very ill, but still managed to give his daughter away. Peggy always spoke of him as being a gentle man, and despite her mother's often hard and cold ways, they had a solid relationship. During Peggy's first pregnancy with her son Tony, Harry sadly died, never to meet his grandson. Peggy and Wilf settled into life in their tiny farm workers cottage, and she recalls this as being one of the happiest times of her life. They had no electricity/water/sewage, just a black range and tilly lamps.

Gillian arrived 2½ years later, and shortly after this, much to Wilf's dismay, they were landed with their second home, Uplands, passed on from Hettie, another one of her "good ideas" which had gone wrong. Uplands required a lifetime's work and dedication to haul it into the 20th century, and Wilf at that time was working 7 days a week on the farm, and then coming home to renovate the house. Hard times indeed.

Peggy had several jobs over the years, her longest being the school cook at Easton. She carried on working after Wilf retired, and then nursed him with cancer until he died in 1996. In 1997 Peggy moved to Framlingham, into the sort of modern house which Wilf would have hated, and started to embark on a life which in many ways had been denied her whilst living in a remote area outside Easton. She had never driven, and seldom saw her old friends, but seemed to somehow make the most of a simple lifestyle.

In Framlingham she joined all the clubs, and made many friends, and was often seen out in one of the local hostelrys having Sunday lunch with her new-found friends.

She was very independent, and happy, her little dog Lady keeping her company on her daily walks. Her friends Beryl, Anna and Nettie all lived close by, and they were often referred to as the "Musketeers" by those who knew them.

Sadly Peggy contracted dementia, around 2005, and although she continued to live independently, following a minor op her condition worsened quite quickly. Gillian managed to help her stay at home for 2 years, but then her deterioration necessitated a move to a more secure environment.

Peggy moved into the new Rendlesham Care centre in 2009, and never seemed to question it was no longer her own home, and for a while she was able to integrate into a different way of life. Sadly her condition worsened and for the last 2 years of her life she was unable to walk or feed herself, and life became very different.

Her passing has left a big gap in her family's life and she will be very much missed by not only her family, but friends and colleagues alike. We thank God for Peggy's life. May she rest in peace.

We send our love and sympathy to Gill, Mike, Tony, Sophie, Edward and Tristan and our prayers that they may know God's comfort.

FRAMLINGHAM MEDICAL PRACTICE - FLU SATURDAY

We will be holding our Annual Flu Clinic on ***Saturday 13th October***, 9.30am to 12.30pm. The Department of Health recommends that all patients who are over 65 have a flu vaccination, as well as all those who are under 65 who have:

People with a serious medical condition:

- long term chest conditions such as asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), bronchitis or emphysema;
- heart conditions such as heart failure, angina or atrial fibrillation
- kidney disease;
- liver disease such as cirrhosis or hepatitis;
- chronic neurological disease, such as Parkinson's disease or motor neurone disease;
- diabetes;
- a weakened immune system due to: a disease such as HIV; or treatment for some conditions such as cancer; or people taking special medicines for diseases such as rheumatoid arthritis or psoriasis.

All pregnant women

People who are in receipt of a carer's allowance, or those who are the main carer

If you are in one of these groups, it is recommended that you have a 'Flu vaccination. If you have got any questions about your eligibility, please telephone the surgery and ask to speak to one of our Practice Nurses.

HOME START SUFFOLK COASTAL

There is no rule book for raising a family and sometimes it can seem overwhelming, particularly if you are going through a difficult time.



Home-Start is for families living in the Suffolk Coastal District, who have at least one child under 5 years of age. Families may need support for many reasons; coping with postnatal illness, a child's disability, family breakdown, or bereavement, or maybe feeling isolated and unable to connect with the local community. Whatever the reason Home-Start provides non-judgemental practical and emotional support and helps build confidence and ability to cope.

Our parent volunteers visit weekly for 2-3 hours. Generally we say that volunteers are not 'cooks, cleaners or babysitters', what they can do is be an extra pair of hands, or listening ears, they may accompany families to appointments, groups, or even the supermarket! But first of all they'll be a friend.

Home-Start also runs Family Groups in Leiston, Felixstowe, and Woodbridge

Family groups provide parents in need of support with a safe, stimulating environment where they feel accepted, included and encouraged to play with their children and make new friends.

Family groups are much smaller than mother & toddler groups, with up to eight families attending a session.

TIMES PAST

In 2004 we looked at some of the buildings that had disappeared from our two villages since 1904. However some vanished before this time. One of these was 'Rectory Lodge', Kettleburgh. It was a double dweller, probably thatched which stood at the right of the entrance to the Old Rectory in Rectory Road.

By 1841 when the first Census naming residents was taken it was beginning to deteriorate. The worst half, of three rooms, was then occupied by two separate tenants. One was Jane Haddock aged 70, a widow whose husband George, an agricultural labourer had died in 1833 at the age of 64. Jane continued to live there until some time after 1851 but no more is known about her.

The other tenant was Samuel Hart, 35, a journeyman shoemaker and seller of blacking. He was also a poet whose rhymes were mainly used on local tombstones. For example that of William Turner, son of Samuel and Maria Turner, who died in 1833, aged 18:-

‘Short was my life yet long my rest may be
Cut off in youth, as you may plainly see
Nursed up with care, and parents dear had I,
They loved me well and grieved to see me die.’

By 1861 Isaac Crawfoot, a farmer's ploughman and his wife and daughter had moved into this half of the double dweller, they remained there until some time after 1871 when the cottage became uninhabitable.

Meanwhile the other 3 roomed half of the double dweller became the home of James and Emma Friend and their family. James had been employed as coachman by the Rector since about 1841 and was married at Kettleburgh in 1849. Both he and his wife were unable to read or write.

For some reason 1850 and 1851 found them living at the Chequers where James held the position of licensee. Perhaps lack of literacy made it too difficult but, for whatever reason, 1861 found them back at Rectory Lodge where James continued his employment as coachman. James Friend, Junior, aged 10 was described as a scholar so his parents realised that reading and writing were necessary; the school in Kettleburgh was not opened until 1878, therefore any instruction before that date required payment.

The Friends continued their tenancy at Rectory Lodge. However in November 1880 a local lad of 13 threw stones at one of the windows which was seen by Mrs Friend. A case was brought against him at Framlingham in which the fine and costs amounted to 13 shillings and 6 pence. His father refusing to pay, the boy was sent to prison for a fortnight.

By 1891 James had retired but he and his wife remained at rectory Lodge until his death, at the age of 81, in 1892. By this time the building must have worsened because by 1901 it was no longer in existence.
